Everyone has pet peeves, we call them pets because it seems we like them to stay around.

I have a bevy of pet peeves, a flock of forget-me-nevers.

One is - and it does not apply to you or your keys - is:

1) Why when designing up and down keys don't people put a base that extends to the centre line of the knob button? If they do not do this, the key will often tip.

The Lennart Pettersson key mentioned in the FISTS Newsletter is such a key, beautiful but why-oh-why did they truncate the base so short? It's annoying to use and have the key tip, and it's annoying to see it like this.





Interestingly I found an alternate version which looks like it was factory made.

That's very elegant, maybe it was some individual's handiwork, if so, BRAVO.



Marconi's MIMCo got it wrong with the 365, A, B, C, D keys but for the 365EZ and FZ they corrected the problem - even though they discarded the beautiful painted brass box for a zinc Eddystone box.

Some added bases to the 365 keys to get it right as in this photo.

Marconi's MIMCo 365EZ/FZ type keys that fixed the problem.

Marconi should have known better, they got it right with their Salami Slicer, the famous Marconi Guillotine key used on spark radio stations, the lever shorted the arc at the contacts so they key could break the arc and resume sending.

Modern makers of the fabulous PS-213 - which I believe is the best sending Morse key ever made - have corrected the problem that existed with Marconi's version - too short a base.

Phil GONVT's model of a PS-213 type key with a special basket weave spring tension/spacing assembly. He had built a PS-213 for me, but he admitted it was a lot of work with the extra fiddly pieces, but I insisted and got a beautiful base for my 213 replica

he got it right. This key is that of R/O Lino Natale, IZODDD who was radio officer at Roma Radio/IAR and knew about the defect in the keys at the station! He has many of our friend Alberto's keys.

Alberto also got it right with his Swedish keys - a long base under the knob.
